

BOOKED FOR VIRAL MOTORCYCLE STUNT AT MUMBAI'S BKC, 3 GRANTED BAIL

THE MUMBAI POLICE HAD REGISTERED A CASE AFTER THEY WERE ALERTED ABOUT A VIDEO SHOWING A MAN RIDING A BIKE WITH TWO WOMEN AND PERFORMING DANGEROUS STUNTS.

Three people, who were arrested by the Mumbai police after a video allegedly showing them performing a dangerous stunt on a motorbike went viral, were granted bail. While the main accused, who was riding the bike, was granted bail after 19 days in jail, two women booked along with him spent 14 and eight days in jail, respectively, before being granted bail.

US SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS ACCESS TO ABORTION PILL

THE SUPREME COURT DECISION EFFECTIVELY FREEZES THE LOWER COURT RULINGS PENDING THE AN APPELLATE COURT HEARING OF THE APPEAL FROM THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT AND MIFEPRISTONE MANUFACTURER DANCO LABORATORIES.



Washington: The US Supreme Court on Friday temporarily preserved access to a widely used abortion pill, freezing rulings by lower courts that would have banned or severely restricted availability of the drug. Two conservative justices disagreed with the decision in the most significant abortion case to reach the nine-member court since it overturned the constitutional right to the procedure 10 months ago. Without commenting on the merits of the case, the decision by the nation's highest court means that mifepristone, which accounts for more than half of the abortions in the United States, will remain available while the case plays out in an appeals court. The Justice Department of President Joe Biden had filed an emergency appeal asking the Supreme Court to block the lower court rulings that would have banned or limited use of mifepristone. The case stems from a ruling by a US District Court judge in Texas, in a lawsuit brought by anti-abortion groups, that would have banned mifepristone, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 2000. An appeals court blocked a ban on the pill, but imposed tough restrictions on access, after which the baton was handed to the Supreme Court, where conservatives wield a 6-3 majority. The Supreme Court decision effectively freezes the lower court rulings pending the an appellate court hearing of the appeal from the Justice Department and mifepristone manufacturer Danco Laboratories. Reacting to the Supreme Court move, Biden said the lower court decisions "would have undermined FDA's medical judgment and put women's health at risk." "As a result of the Supreme Court's stay, mifepristone remains available and approved for safe and effective use while we continue this fight in the courts," Biden said in a statement. "I will continue to fight politically-driven attacks on women's health." - "Deeply misguided" -

CHILD BEATING CASE: PLAYGROUP TEACHER WITHDRAWS PRE-ARREST BAIL PLEA

On April 15, additional sessions judge NL Kale in the city had rejected the pre-arrest bail plea of Jinal Chheda, 42, and she had approached the HC. Calling the acts "heinous and against society", the sessions court had rejected similar pleas of two women teachers accused of cruelty and assault on children at a Kandivli playgroup. The rejection orders had cited the CCTV footage from January this year to March 27 of the premises to say children were noticeable "brutally beaten" and photographs showed kids aged two to four years old were mistreated in the institute by the two teachers. An offence was registered under the Juvenile Justice Act against the duo at the Kandivli police Station. On Friday, before the HC single Judge bench of Justice Anuja Prabhudessai, for the complainant, lawyers Mrunmayee Chowkidar and Tejas Deshpande sought to intervene

and opposed grant of any relief saying the trial court denial was justified. The trial court had found prima facie material on record to draw an inference that "due to very cruel behaviour" of the teacher, those little children are in depression and now not ready to go to school. Justice Prabhudessai was not inclined to grant any relief to Chheda who through her lawyer Sushrita Daga, then sought to and was allowed to withdraw her application.

India has reported 12,193 new Covid Cases over the last 24 hours. With the surge, the country now has 65,556 active cases. The death toll due to the viral disease has climbed to 5,31,300 with 42 more fatalities, including 10 reconciled by Kerala, according to the ministry's data updated at 8 am. Besides, data released on Friday revealed that the XBB.1.16 is the dominant variant of Omicron that was driving the case surge in Maharashtra.

Here are key updates related to the virus.

- Maharashtra on Friday reported 993 Covid cases and five deaths, which took the tally to 81,60,499 and the toll to 1,48,497, a health official said. 681 cases were caused by the XBB.1.16 dominant variant of the virus, and five persons succumbed. Mumbai and Pune recorded two deaths each while the fifth fatality was in Nagpur, a PTI report said.
- Of the 1,348 fresh coronavirus cases recorded in Haryana, over 50% were reported from Gurugram and Faridabad, combined. They have been fuelling the current surge in infections in the state.
- Among other Haryana districts, Rohtak and Jind reported 89 cases each while Hisar, Panchkula and Jhajjar reported 68, 59 and 55 cases, respectively, according to the bulletin released on Friday.
- The Centre on Friday asked eight states including Uttar Pradesh, Tamil Nadu and Maharashtra to maintain a strict watch and take preemptive action in any area of concern to control any emerging spread of Covid 19.

A rise in positivity rate has also been noted across the country, with 5.5 per cent positivity reported in the week ending April 19 against 4.7 per cent positivity reported in the previous week, said Union Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan on Friday.

MUMBAI CYBER SAFE: MAN MISTAKENLY CLICKS LOAN APP LINK; GETS DUPED OF OVER ₹1 LAKH

MUMBAI: A 32-YEAR-OLD MAN WENT THROUGH A NIGHTMARE AFTER HE MISTAKENLY CLICKED ON A LOAN APP LINK ONCE THE APP GOT INSTALLED ON THE PHONE, HE EVEN RECEIVED RS1.03 LAKH CREDIT, WHICH HE NEVER ASKED FOR. NEPAL MAN WITH FAKE WORK DOCUMENTS OFFLOADED AT MUMBAI AIRPORT

MUMBAI: A NEPALESE MAN HAS BEEN ARRESTED AT SAHAR AIRPORT FOR ALLEGEDLY TRYING TO TRAVEL ABROAD USING FORGED DOCUMENTS. TEJ NARAYAN MAHATO (36), WHO WAS TO FLY TO SOUTH AFRICA ON WEDNESDAY, WAS OFF-LOADED FROM THE FLIGHT FOR CARRYING A FAKE NO OBJECTION CERTIFICATE (NOC), PERMITTING HIM TO WORK ABROAD AS A LABOURER. SUCH AN NOC IS A MANDATORY DOCUMENT FOR SOMEONE SEEKING EMPLOYMENT IN THE 'LABOUR' CATEGORY. THE MAN HAD SHOWN HIS NOC TO IMMIGRATION OFFICIALS WHO ALLOWED HIM TO PROCEED WITH THE OTHER CHECKS BEFORE HE HAD BOARDED THE FLIGHT. HOWEVER, IMMIGRATION STAFF HAD, AT THE SAME TIME, PASSED ON A COPY OF THE NOC TO THE NEPAL EMBASSY IN NEW DELHI TO VERIFY ITS AUTHENTICITY HE HAD BOARDED THE FLIGHT WHEN THE OFFICIALS GOT A REVERT FROM THE EMBASSY, STATING THAT THE NOC HAD NOT BEEN ISSUED BY THEM.
