### THANE MURDER: FED UP WITH THE IRRITABILITY OF THE FATHER, THE SON KILLED HIM BY CRUSHING HIS HEAD WITH A STONE, LATER SLIT HIS THROAT

**Mumbai Crime:** In Dombivli, Maharashtra, a 21-year-old son brutally murdered his 68-year-old father after being fed up with his illness. Fed up with Shyamsundar Shinde's illness, Tejas Shinde first threw a stone at his father's head and then slit his throat with a knife while he was sleeping. After the murder, the accused himself called the police station and told that he had killed his father. This incident has spread sensation in the entire area.

According to the police, Shyamsundar Shinde lived with his wife and son Tejas in the Bhoirwadi area of Khambalpada in Dombivli. Teja's studies in college. While his father worked as a security guard at Mumbai Municipal Corporation. Shyamsundar Shinde was running ill for the last few months. Shyamsundar's habit of teasing had increased due to illness. Tejas and Shyamsundar always used to argue about this matter.

In a fit of anger, he put his father to death.

According to the police, the accused has been identified as Tejas Shinde and the name of the deceased is Shyamsundar Shinde. Shyamsundar was working as a security guard in the Mumbai Municipal Corporation and was not keeping well for the last few months. Shyam Sundar's irritability had increased due to illness.



There was always an argument between Tejas and Shyam Sundar on some or the other matter. One day when Tejas's mother went out of the house for some work. That day again there was an argument between father and son. Enraged, Tejas threw a stone at his father's head and slit his throat with a knife.

Accused Tejas later called Tilak Nagar police station and informed them about the murder. The police immediately reached Shyamsundar's house in the Bhoirwadi area of Khambalpada in Dombivli and arrested Tejas. A case has been registered against the accused under relevant sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC).

**Mumbai Crime:** In Maharashtra's Kashimira police station, a woman has lodged a complaint about being pushed into prostitution instead of getting a job as a domestic help abroad. On the allegation of a 43-year-old woman, a case of smuggling has been registered against unknown agents in the matter of promising to get work in Oman. The victim, a resident of Mira Road, Mumbai, used to work as a casting agent for junior artists in Hindi films. The victim had paid Rs 3 lakh to an agent to get her a job in Oman.

In June 2022, the victim contacted an agent she had met on Justdial. After this the woman met the agent and his boss in Andheri. Both of them promised the victim a job as a maid in Oman with a monthly salary of Rs 25,000. Initially the woman did not like this deal and she refused. When the agent made the woman a better offer, she accepted the job in Muscat.



### ONION SHORTAGE THREATENS NEW CHAPTER IN WORLD FOOD CRISIS THE EXPERIENCES OF THE TWO WOMEN MORE THAN 7,500 MILES (12,000 KILOMETERS) APART SHOWS HOW THE GLOBAL CRISIS OVER FOOD SUPPLIES IS TAKING AN ALARMING TWIST.

Lalaine Basa would buy a kilo of onions to make spring rolls at her catering business north of Manila. She's now changed her recipe to use half the amount because of soaring prices in the Philippines.

In the Moroccan capital Rabat, Fatima no longer buys onions and tomatoes because they are too expensive. She gets artichokes to cook tagine instead. "The market is on fire," said the mother of three.

The experiences of the two women more than 7,500 miles (12,000 kilometers) apart shows how the global crisis over food supplies is taking an alarming twist: threatening to consume ingredients critical to the world's nutrition.

The costs of wheat and grains have fallen in recent months, easing concern over access to some staples. But a combination of factors is now shaking up the vegetable market, the backbone of a healthy, sustainable diet. And at the sharp end of that is the humble onion.

### RS 12 LAKH CRORE GONE! HINDENBURG CONTINUES TO MAKE ADANI STOCKS BLEED

**ADANI GROUP'S MARKET CAPITALISATION STOOD AT ROUGHLY OVER RS 19 LAKH CRORE BEFORE JANUARY 24, BUT HAS PLUNGED TO LESS THAN RS 7.3 LAKH CRORE IN JUST A MONTH AFTER US SHORT SELLER HINDENBURG RESEARCH RELEASED AN EXPLOSIVE REPORT.**

By India Today Business Desk: The value of 10 listed Adani Group companies has tanked Rs 12 lakh crore or nearly \$145 billion in just a month, in one of the sharpest market capitalisation slides witnessed in the history of domestic stock markets.

Adani Group's market capitalisation stood at roughly over Rs 19 lakh crore before January 24, but has plunged to approximately Rs 7.2 lakh crore in just a month after a US short seller released an explosive report, accusing the conglomerate of stock manipulation and improper use of tax havens.

The short seller also flagged concerns about the group's mounting debt and warned that seven of its main listed companies had a 85 per cent downside risk. Today, three of the group's worst-hit stocks - Adani Total Gas, Adani Green Energy and Adani Transmission - are down nearly 80 per cent in just a month.

Compared to their 52-week highs, these stocks are down up to 82%. It may be noted that all the three listed Adani Group companies have hit their 52-week lows.

When the report was released by Hindenburg on January 24, little did the apple-to-airport conglomerate expect it to cause such damage to its market value. Even experts and analysts shrugged off the report, stating that the report would not have any material impact on the group and that the stocks would recover soon.

But one month later, listed companies of the Adani Group are struggling on the stock market, with shares down from 25-80 per cent. This highlights how badly the Hindenburg report has impacted companies owned by billionaire Gautam Adani, whose net worth fell from \$120 billion to just over \$41 billion as a result of the rout in stocks.

"Our social bonding is very strong. All seeds can grow here except those of hatred. Our gurus have taught us brotherhood and harmony," CM Mann ironically said as Khalistanis were getting the Punjab police to bend to their violent whims.

While Bhagwant Mann asserted that seeds of hatred cannot grow in Punjab, the recent sequence of events in Punjab and the "peaceful" protests staged by the supporters led by the Waris Punjab De leader suggests otherwise. It was seen how the supporters of Amritpal and Lovepreet Toofan carried out a "peaceful" protest using lathis, swords, and guns and attacked Punjab Police officers with sticks, and broke the barricades. ## WHAT S JAISHANKAR SAID ON PAKISTAN ECONOMIC CRISIS: 'NO COUNTRY WILL EVER...'

S Jaishankar On Pakistan Economic Crisis: S Jaishankar said that it is in nobody's interest is any country- least of all a neighbouring country- gets into severe economic crisis.

As Pakistan faces a severe economic crisis, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said that no country can come out of the difficult situation "if its basic industry is terrorism." Jaishankar made the comments while speaking at the annual Asia Economic Dialogue organised by the external affairs ministry in Pune.

"The reality of this particular relationship (India-Pakistan) is that it has a fundamental issue which we cannot and we must not avoid. And that issue is that of terrorism because the moment you start doing this walk around that...", Jaishankar said.

"And we mustn't be in denial of what are very fundamental problems in that relationship. And just as a country has to fix its economic issues, a country has to fix its political issues, too. A country has to fix its social issues too. No country will ever come out of a difficult situation and become prosperous power if its basic industry is terrorism," Jaishankar added.

He also said that it is in nobody's interest is any country- least of all a neighbouring country- gets into severe economic crisis.

"There's no doubt role or salience of Asia will increase. Asia is growing because Asia has been global, what we shouldn't fall for is 'Asia for Asians', that rhetoric is misleading, appeals to primitive chauvinism.

## PAK MINISTERS CAN'T FLY BUSINESS CLASS OR STAY IN 5-STAR HOTELS ABROAD

The world's fifth most populous country has descended dangerously close to a debt default in recent months

Pakistani ministers can no longer fly business class or stay in five-star hotels abroad. And the government thanks them for taking salary cuts.

The South Asian nation fighting to stay solvent and avoid a debt default has unveiled \$764 million of cost-cutting measures needed to help revive a \$6.5 billion of International Monetary Fund bailout. The government will follow up with further austerity measures in the next budget in July, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said Wednesday.

"This is need of the hour," he said after a cabinet meeting in Islamabad. "We have to show what the time demands from us and that's austerity, simplicity and sacrifice."

The world's fifth most populous country has descended dangerously close to a debt default in recent months. The \$350-billion economy, with just \$3 billion of foreign-exchange reserves by one estimate, also faces a dollar squeeze that tests its external stability. Supply disruptions caused by flooding, food shortages and steps the government took to meet IMF's preconditions for the rescue may push inflation above 30% for the first time on record, according to Bloomberg Economics.

As common people come out on streets to protest crippling conditions, the government is trying to show austerity begins at the highest levels. Several federal and state ministers besides high-ranking government officials have volunteered to forgo salaries
